He is the God of Our Hope

As I examine the word “hope” in The New Unger’s Bible Dictionary, it explains that in the Old Testament, hope signifies safety, security, and trust. In the New Testament, it represents an expectation of good, joyful, and contented expectation of eternal salvation.

Given all that is happening in our government and economy today, it is clear we need the God of hope more than ever. There is no one else we can truly depend on. So many people face depression, anxiety, and a growing disrespect for one another. If you have driven on the highway recently, you know how intimidating it can be; I don’t even want to get on the Beltway. But because of my hope in God, I still get out there. This everyday challenge reminds me that hope is not just a concept but a source of strength in difficult moments. Nothing in this world is truly secure except the hope we have in the God who saves, protects, leads, and delivers us. That is where our hope should rest.



As I am writing this, I would like to share my personal experience. My husband no longer works; he does not have a retirement plan, except for Social Security, which we are grateful. Our income has changed drastically, but God continues to provide for us. I have had to cut back on some of the things I used to do, but I am okay. God is providing in ways I never expected.


For example, I had hip replacement surgery this summer, which meant I could not work my usual summer job. During my recovery, a friend felt led to give me a certain amount of money each month that I was unable to work. This unexpected help reminded me that support can come from places I never anticipated. God really does provide, and He is our hope.

The word hope appears in the Bible over 143 times in the New King James version. Here are a few scriptures to stand on:

- **Isaiah 40:31**, “but those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary; they will walk and not be faint.”
- **Michah 7:7**, “But as for me, I watch in hope for the LORD, I wait for God my Savior; my God will hear me.”
- **Romans 15:13**, “May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit.”
- **Psalms 33:18**, “Behold, the eye of the LORD is on those who fear Him, On those who hope in His mercy,”
- **Psalms 119:114**, “You are my hiding place and my shield; I hope in Your word.”
- **Hebrews 10:23**, “Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful.”

My grandma used to sing a song around the house called “My Hope is Built on Nothing Less.” This song reminds me that true hope is found in Christ, just as my grandma believed. If you don’t know Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior, I encourage you to turn to page 8 and read the Romans Road. If you believe in your heart what you read, along with acknowledging the prayer, you can be saved.

A Thankful Heart: Your Anchor in the Storm



Gratitude



Life often feels overwhelming with its constant challenges and heavy news. Yet, in the middle of it all, God offers us peace through a simple but powerful practice: gratitude. The Apostle Paul reminds us in 1 Thessalonians 5:18, "Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."

God does not ask us to be thankful for our struggles, but to be thankful while we are in them. He welcomes our honesty, our tears, and our fears, just as David poured out his heart in the Psalms. When we cast our cares on Him (1 Peter 5:7), we exchange our heavy burdens for His sustaining strength.

Imagine you are carrying a backpack filled with heavy stones – stones of worry, fear, and responsibility. Each time you give your concerns to God, you are handing Him those stones and allowing Him to carry what you cannot. Gratitude is the discipline that shifts our eyes from the storm to the Savior who calms it.

Practical Ways to Cultivate Gratitude:



Gratitude List: Write down three things each night you are thankful for, no matter how small. This simple act retrains your mind to look for the good.



"Thank You" Prayers: Begin prayer by thanking God before making requests. This shifts your focus from what you lack to the abundance you already have in Him.



Sanctuary of Stillness: Take five quiet minutes daily to rest in God's presence with a thankful heart. Take a few deep breaths and focus on the truth of His presence. In that stillness, whisper a prayer of thanks for His steadfast love and for the peace that only He can provide.

Gratitude does not silence life's storms, but it anchors us to the One who never lets us go. As we learn to thank Him in all circumstances, His peace will guard our hearts and minds in Christ.

Colossians 3:15 (NIV)

When God Calls, Courage Answers

“And who knows but that you have come to your royal position for such a time as this?” – Esther 4:14

There comes a moment in every believer's life when God's call interrupts comfort. For Esther, that moment came in the palace, a place of privilege and safety. She had hidden her identity, quietly living within the walls of royalty while her people faced destruction. Then came Mordecai's message, a challenge wrapped in truth and urgency letting her know that she was there for a purpose, and this was her moment to act.

In the same way, we are not where we are by accident. Every role, relationship, and season is part of a greater design. Sometimes God's hand will position us in visible influences, other times in quiet faithfulness, but always with a purpose.

Esther's initial response was fear. Approaching the king uninvited could mean death. Her hesitation is understandable. Courage, after all, does not mean living without fear, it means moving forward in faith despite fear. Esther's courage was not born from self-confidence, but from trust in God's providence. This is where we often find ourselves. God calls us into moments that stretch us beyond what feels comfortable or safe. It may be standing up for truth, offering forgiveness, sharing our faith, or stepping into an unfamiliar calling. In each case, courage is not about our strength but about relying on God's strength.

When Esther chose to act, her obedience changed the course of history. Her courage preserved an entire people. Our decisions may not seem as dramatic, but they, too, have ripple effects. Every time we choose faith over fear, we create space for God's light to shine. Our courage can strengthen families, encourage communities, and inspire others to rise up in their own callings.

We live in challenging times that are uncertain and divided. And yet, it is into this very moment that God calls us. Just as Esther was placed in her royal position, you and I are placed here and now for a reason. Your workplace, your neighborhood, your church, your family; they are your “palace,” your place of influence. You have been given gifts, relationships, and opportunities that equip you to make a difference. The question is not whether you are called, but whether you will step into the call with courage.


How do you live out this kind of courage?

- **Remember your placement:** You are where you are because God put you there.
- **Rely on God's strength:** Courage flows not from self-reliance, but from trust in God.
- **Recognize the ripple effect:** Your faithful steps encourage others and creates a lasting impact.
- **Respond to the call:** Say “yes” to God, even when fear whispers “no.”

Like Esther, we are invited to rise with faith and courage, knowing that God is our strength and our moment is now. Who knows but that you, too, have been positioned for such a time as this? When God calls, will you have the courage to answer?

Sinners That Need A Savior



On the sixth day of creation, God looked at everything that he had made and said it was “very good” (Genesis 1:31). By Genesis 6:5, it is recorded that God saw how great the wickedness of the human race had become on the earth, and that every inclination of the thoughts of the human heart was only evil all the time. About mankind, scriptures say all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God (Romans 3:23); there is no one righteous, not even one; there is no one who understands; and there is no one who seeks God (Romans 3:10-11). How did we get this way?

Romans 5:12 explains that through one man (Adam), sin entered the world, and death through sin, and so death spread to all men because all sinned. God tells us what is right, what is wrong, and how we are to live (commandments or laws). We sin when we disobey a law of God, rebel against, and dishonor Him (1 John 3:4). We sin when we fail to do what we have been commanded to do and when we do what we have been commanded not to do.

The backstory of how man went from being “good” to being “wicked” (the “fall of man”) is described in Genesis 3. God’s command to Adam was, “You may surely eat of every tree of the garden, but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die.” Satan, in the form of a serpent, deceived Eve, and she ate from the forbidden tree. She gave some to Adam, and he also ate of it. Because of their disobedience, they suffered consequences as God had forewarned.

They lost their innocence, God cursed them, cursed the ground, and drove them out of Eden. They died spiritually (separated from God), and they also began to die physically (Genesis 3:19). Adam and Eve, the foreparents of mankind, passed their sinful nature to their offspring. Everyone is born spiritually dead and with an inclination to sin, and each of us commits and is guilty of our own sin (1 John 1:9).

We are all sinners from birth. God has declared that the wages of sin are death (Romans 6:23), and we were destined to die physically and then spend eternity separated from God. However, the “good news” is that God has provided a savior, Jesus Christ. Through faith in Jesus’ death and resurrection as payment for our sin debt, our relationship with God can be restored, and we will become spiritually alive (born again). We will receive a new nature, and the Holy Spirit of God will come to live within us.

Romans 5:18-19 sums it up: Consequently, just as one trespass resulted in condemnation for all people, so also one righteous act resulted in justification and life for all people. For just as through the disobedience of the one man (Adam) the many were made sinners, so also through the obedience of the one man (Jesus) the many will be made righteous!

We are all sinners in need of a Savior, and Christ has come to bring forgiveness of our sins and everlasting life in God’s presence. During these turbulent times, will you embrace Jesus’ sacrificial gift if you have not done so? If you have been born again, will you let His grace move you to share His hope with others?

Living a Lifestyle of Thanksgiving

Many times, when we think about Thanksgiving, we picture a traditional holiday when family and friends come together and enjoy each other's company and share good food. However, as a believer, we know that it is more than just a traditional day of giving thanks. It is a heartfelt posture of gratitude toward God for His unfailing love, provision, and faithfulness.

Scripture reminds us in Psalm 107:1 to “give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; His mercy endures forever,” emphasizing that true thanksgiving begins with acknowledging God as the source of every blessing. Throughout the Bible, God's people paused to remember His goodness, whether through sacrifices, prayers, or songs of praise. In the New Testament, believers are encouraged to “give thanks in all circumstances” (1 Thessalonians 5:18), not just when life is easy, but as an act of faith and trust in God. Therefore, Thanksgiving is not merely a tradition; it is an expression of worship, humility, and joyful recognition that every good gift comes from above.

Here are five clear examples from the Bible of people expressing thanksgiving toward God:

1. **King David through Psalms of Praise** – David wrote many psalms overflowing with gratitude, such as Psalm 100 and Psalm 103, where he called all people to “enter His gates with thanksgiving.” His songs were acts of worship, publicly declaring God's goodness.
2. **The Israelites' Offering After Crossing the Red Sea (Exodus 15)** – After God rescued them from Pharaoh, Moses and Miriam led the people in a song of thanksgiving and celebration, praising God for His deliverance.
3. **Hannah's Prayer After Receiving Samuel (1 Samuel 2:1–10)** – After God answered her prayer for a child, Hannah did not forget Him. She returned to the temple to dedicate Samuel to the Lord and offered a powerful prayer of thanksgiving.
4. **Daniel Giving Thanks Despite Danger (Daniel 6:10)** – Even when it became illegal to pray, Daniel continued kneeling before God three times a day, giving thanks as he always had, showing gratitude even in trials.
5. **Jesus Giving Thanks Before Miracles and Meals (John 6:11; Matthew 26:26-27)** – Before feeding the 5,000 and even before the Last Supper, Jesus paused to give thanks to the Father, modeling gratitude in both abundance and sacrifice.

These biblical examples show that thanksgiving was not just spoken, it was sung, lived, offered, and demonstrated through obedience. This year, encourage your family and friends to move beyond just one day of tradition and embrace a daily lifestyle of gratitude and thankfulness to GOD.

What is the Agag in your life?

As a preliminary to the time of Esther, God issued an assignment. Samuel called King Saul and gave him the word of the Lord. "Now go and attack Amalek, and utterly destroy all that they have, and do not spare them. But kill both man and woman, infant and nursing child, ox and sheep, camel and donkey." Agag was king of the Amalekites. Saul rewrote the assignment and added a conditional clause. Be mindful that it is not you when God asks something of you. Partial disobedience is disobedience. Saul told Samuel and himself that he did as the Lord asked. However, in his declaration was a "but".

Definition of the word but: used to introduce a phrase or clause contrasting with what has already been mentioned, an argument against something; an objection. Do we sometimes think we know better than God? When Moses was asked to be the spokesperson and objected, he did so at the time of the assignment. I like to say the time to confer with God about your assignment is when you are given the assignment, not to go off and do something else other than what was given and accepted. It also doesn't mean you don't still get the assignment. In Moses' case, God modified the assignment slightly, allowing Aaron to speak to the people.

However, in Saul's case, God spoke, and Saul was expected to carry it out. The word utterly means everything, all, nothing left, but the people took their eyes off the task and started examining the condition of the spoils. Saul let this happen. There was another biblical character caught looking at a tree and thinking how good the fruit looked, disobeying God's word, and took the fruit. Disobeying the word of God can have long-term consequences that will extend across generations.

There is a danger to us when we allow ourselves to think that we need to evaluate the situation ourselves and begin to consider compromise. Be careful, this is not like giving eight percent of your income and calling it your tithe. The Lord has defined what the tithe is; Deuteronomy 14:22-23, don't change the definition. There is a scripture that encourages us not to be lukewarm; we should be all-in. Be either cold or hot; anything else and God discards.

In Saul's case, his disobedience was discovered, and he suffered the consequences. That day, the rule over the kingdom was torn away from him. Why do we think we have a better idea than the God idea handed to us? We begin to create a plan for a future we may not even know we will have, based on what we see or understand at the moment. Saul also blamed the people, saying, "They brought back, for a sacrifice unto the Lord." I wonder if that was really what they were thinking when they were picking through the findings.



From this scripture in 1 Samuel, we find the verse "Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice." Saul confessed that he had listened to people rather than the word of the Lord. We must never forget that we are on one level and God is just on another. We cannot deal with Him and His word like any person we talk with; He is not like a man. God speaks and acts, He promises and fulfills. Esther had to face the Agagite again because the one called to remove them rejected the word of the Lord.

What is the Agag in your life? What has God called you to and you have yet to do? Is it things, people, your career, your definition of success, sought-after treasures or trophies, personal desires, or time-consuming fruitless activities? It is not only costing you, but those who come behind you. Utterly destroy the Agag, so it doesn't cut off your blessings or the ones you want to leave your children. See for yourself and those you are not aware of, that God can help you overcome the Agag in your life, so that history does not repeat itself in this fight, whatever it may be. It's not too late.



You can start by taking a walk down the Romans Road (see the bookmark on the right, which guides you through acknowledging your sins, recognizing your need for salvation, believing in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior, confessing that belief, and calling upon His name). Take this step in faith, repentance, and surrender to receive God's gift of eternal life and reconciliation.

After you have walked down the Romans Road and meditated on the related scriptures, recite the prayer below. It is not just merely reciting the words in this prayer that will save you, but rather it should be a genuine heart transformation and repentance that will lead to salvation (being saved).

Dear Lord God, I come to You today, knowing that I need Your forgiveness. I confess that I have sinned and fallen short of Your glory. I do believe that Jesus Christ is Your Son, that He died on the cross for my sins, and that You raised Him from the dead so that I could be saved and have eternal life. Lord, I ask You to forgive me. Wash me clean and make me new. I open the door of my heart and invite You in. Be my Lord and Savior. I surrender my life to You today. Thank You for saving me, and for giving me the gift of eternal life. In Jesus' name, Amen.

As you continue to mature in your relationship with Jesus, deepening your faith will come by hearing the word of God, prayer, meditation, bible study, and connecting with a church where you can continue on your spiritual journey.


